





Remote education provision: information for parents

This information is intended to provide clarity and transparency to pupils and parents or carers about what to expect from remote education where national or local restrictions require entire cohorts (or bubbles) to remain at home.

The remote curriculum: what is taught to pupils at home

What should my child expect from remote education? Will my child be taught broadly the same curriculum as they would if they were in school?

We teach the same curriculum remotely as we do in school wherever possible and appropriate. However, we have needed to make some adaptations in some subjects, for example more practical subjects/lessons may need to offer an alternative, e.g. science experiments/DT projects.

Remote teaching and study time each day

How long can I expect work set by the school to take my child each day?

We expect that remote education (including remote teaching and independent work) will take pupils broadly the following number of hours each day:

Key Stage 1	3 hours a day on average
Key Stage 2	4 hours a day on average

Accessing remote education

How will my child access any online remote education you are providing?

Parents can access the home learning from the school website 'Class Pages'.

If my child does not have digital or online access at home, how will you support them to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils may not have suitable online access at home. We take the following approaches to support those pupils to access remote education:

All pupils will be given work books therefore pupils who cannot access online work can complete work in these.

School will lend laptops/tablets to pupils who do not have online access at home where possible. Parents can contact the school directly to discuss this.

How will my child be taught remotely?

We use a combination of the following approaches to teach pupils remotely:

- recorded teaching (e.g. Oak National Academy lessons, White Rose Maths)
- lessons planned by year group teachers which the children can complete in exercise books, provided by school, at home
- printed paper packs produced by teachers (e.g. workbooks, worksheets)
- commercially available websites supporting the teaching of specific subjects or areas, including video clips or sequences

Engagement and feedback

What are your expectations for my child's engagement and the support that we as parents and carers should provide at home?

Staff can expect pupils learning remotely to:

- Be contactable during the school day although consider they may not always be in front of a device the entire time
- > Complete work to the deadline set by teachers
- Seek help if they need it, from teachers or teaching assistants
- > Alert teachers if they're not able to complete work

Staff can expect parents with children learning remotely to:

- > Make the school aware if their child is sick or otherwise can't complete work
- Seek help from the school if they need it
- > Be respectful when making any complaints or concerns known to staff

How will you check whether my child is engaging with their work and how will I be informed if there are concerns?

Engagement is checked daily through work sent in to the year group emails and monitoring learning apps/websites which the children have access to.

Parents will be informed of any concern through weekly phone calls and/or emails.

How will you assess my child's work and progress?

Feedback can take many forms and may not always mean extensive written comments for individual children. For example, whole-class feedback or quizzes marked automatically via digital platforms are also valid and effective methods, amongst many others. Our approach to feeding back on pupil work is as follows:

Daily feedback will be given on any work submitted to the year group emails. This will include marking of the work, feedback on positive aspects of the work and also feedback on areas to improve upon.

Socrative quizzes will also be used throughout remote learning which will be marked instantly for the children within the app.

Additional support for pupils with particular needs

How will you work with me to help my child who needs additional support from adults at home to access remote education?

We recognise that some pupils, for example some pupils with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), may not be able to access remote education without support from adults at home. We acknowledge the difficulties this may place on families, and we will work with parents and carers to support those pupils in the following ways:

Our SENDo and Teachers will support with bespoke resources where required.

Remote education for self-isolating pupils

Where individual pupils need to self-isolate but the majority of their peer group remains in school, how remote education is provided will likely differ from the approach for whole groups. This is due to the challenges of teaching pupils both at home and in school.

If my child is not in school because they are self-isolating, how will their remote education differ from the approaches described above?

Remote education will continue as above for those children who may need to self-isolate.
